

WHY IS SOCIAL JUSTICE UNIQUE?

Social Justice is a refereed quarterly journal that combines analyses of global issues (human rights, peaceful resolution of interstate conflict, terrorism, sovereignty and self-determination) with domestic policy concerns such as civil liberties, welfare reform, the reduction of crime, and race and gender discrimination. It crosses over the usual boundaries of academic disciplines and takes an interdisciplinary approach. Is there any other way to grasp the full meaning of events today?

Social Justice also crosses over geographic boundaries, giving voice to authors rarely found in English-language publications. Its pages link up intellectuals from many countries, with recent articles written by contributors in Australia, Canada, Mexico, England, Israel/Palestine, Uruguay, Slovenia, and Japan.

Finally, *Social Justice* emphasizes the links between theory and practice. Its editors have long been committed to bold social criticism as a distinctive form of knowledge. At the same time, they seek to put forth alternative visions of a just and democratic society. Despite the complexity of the issues, the articles are approachable and well edited.

Social Justice was launched in 1974 under the title *Crime and Social Justice*. Its new title reflects a broadening of focus to incorporate global concerns, while retaining a commitment to high-quality, provocative analysis of issues relating to crime and criminal justice.
